

# Frequently Asked Questions

## Weapon Registration

All authorized privately owned firearms of military personnel assigned to, attached to, or temporarily stationed at Fort Riley, and those of their guests must be registered with the soldiers' unit commander before the firearm is brought onto the Fort Riley installation. The FR Form 102 (Registration Form) should be completed at the unit. Contact the unit arms room for more information.

## Crime Prevention

Fort Riley is a proactive crime prevention post. Special crime prevention posters are available for issue to units and other activities. Robbery awareness classes are presented quarterly for all money handling activities on the installation. Crime prevention surveys are conducted into many areas of the facility. ## Bike Registration

Bicycle Registration: The Ft. Riley Military Police Community Police section has a bicycle registration program, which could possibly aid in the return of your bicycle if it were lost or stolen. The process is easy. Just follow the steps outlined below: 1. Contact one of the Community Police Team members and request a scheduled time and date to register your bicycles. 2. Provide your name and address so we may come to your quarters. 3. Have all of your bicycles present during the scheduled time. 4. Complete the requested information on the provided form. 5. Place the decal on your bicycle. 6. Your bike is registered. \*\* Bikes can also be registered through the physical security office by calling 239 - 6344/6342. All bicycles registered on Ft. Riley are placed in a database maintained at the military police station. The supplied information will assist us in determining who owners are if the bike is recovered, provide more detailed information of the bicycle, and develop trend should stolen bikes become an issue. ## House Watch

The Fort Riley Military Police offer a voluntary home security program for residents of Fort Riley. Residents can sign up for Housewatch when they go on leave or for other periods when their quarters will be vacant. The Military Police will conduct daily after hour physical checks of the quarters as a crime prevention effort. Call the Physical Security Office at (785) 239-6344/6342 a few days before you depart. Call from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Emergency house watches can be left on the recorder during evening hours or on the weekend.

## Recreational Vehicle Storage Lot

The Outdoor Recreation Center, Bldg. 9011 provides a storage lot for recreational vehicles such as campers, boats, trailers, etc for a monthly fee. The lot is secured and fenced. Access to your RV is available 24-hours a day. Contact Outdoor Recreation at (785) 239-2363 for more information.

## School Resource Officer (SRO)

School Resource Officer (SRO): A uniformed police officer who works inside the school. Responsible for bridging the gap between the school administration, students, parents and police. Conducts investigations in regards to violent incidents occurring on campus. Identifies, recommends and intervenes in potential problems by observation, profiling and source information. Conducts conflict resolution, works hand-in-hand with social and psychological services provided by the school district.

## Drug Abuse Resistance and Education (DARE)

Drug Abuse Resistance and Education (DARE): A comprehensive seventeen-week educational program of instruction mandated by state directive to educate our students in what a drug is, how youth fall victim to drugs, ramifications of drug use and how to resist the pressure of drugs. DARE is taught in first, third, fifth and seventh grades on Ft. Riley. DARE also teaches students about the dangers of alcohol and tobacco use.

## Gang Resistance Education and Training (GREAT)

Gang Resistance Education And Training (GREAT): A comprehensive nine week educational program mandated by the Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms to educate the students on what a Gang is, how youth fall into the Gang society, ramifications of being a Gang member, and how to resist the pressure of gang membership. GREAT is designed for grades 3 – 12 with a cooperative summer camp sponsored by USD 475, local municipalities and Ft. Riley.
